#### Pastor's Thoughts on the Passing Times

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

#### Report on the 2023 Synodical Convention:

are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God"

1 Cor. 1:23-24 ESV

The 68<sup>th</sup> Regular LCMS Synodical Convention was held in Milwaukee July 29-August 3. A Synodical Convention is more than just a business meeting, it is also a time for worship, study, presentations, and celebrations. The theme of the Convention was "We preach Christ Crucified". The essays and sermons during the convention centered around that theme. There were also four presentations exploring the Small Catechism.

One of the highlights of the convention is presentations on the work of our partner churches and foreign missionaries. Refugees from Ukraine are being ministered to by our German partner church (SELK) at the Old Latin School in Wittenburg operated by the LCMS and its partners. SELK is also



ministering to a number of Christians fleeing Iran. There is a growing underground Christian movement in Iran despite the oppressive Islamic regime currently in control.

The Convention approved altar and pulpit fellowship with five Lutheran church bodies in South Sudan and Sudan, Finland, Uganda, Ukraine, and Sri Lanka. There were some interesting stories from two of these churches. The bishop of the Finland church and a lay member who is also a member of their parliament have been facing prosecution for incitement again a minority for their support of the Biblical view of men and women. They addressed the convention with their account of this battle. The Synod has been providing helmet and flak jackets to the Ukrainian church. Their bishop brought a helmet back that save his life and subsequently the life of another church member. He presented it to President Harrison who said it will be put in the LCMS museum.

The Convention also had the sad responsibility to recognize that the LCMS is no longer in altar and pulpit fellowship with the Japan Lutheran Church (JLC). The JLC has drifted away from our common doctrine by ordaining women into the ministry and other issues such as open communion. The Synod prays that the JLC will reconsider its decisions and come back into fellowship.

Elections are a significant part of the convention. Matthew Harrison was elected for another term as President prior to the convention. All six Vice-Presidents were reelected at the convention. The convention also voted for members of a number the boards and commissions of Synod and the Concordia Universities.

The Concordia Universities were a major topic and the convention. New Synod bylaws were approved to strengthen the ecclesiastical oversight of the Universities and strength the connections between Synod and the Universities. The five University Presidents present at the convention had significant input into these bylaws and endorsed their approval. The Convention also gave thanks for the ministry performed at the now closed Universities at Portland and Bronxville.

The Convention also addressed the action the board of regents of Concordia University Texas took to unilaterally attempt to separate from Synod. The Convention affirmed that the attempted action by regents violates both the Commandments and the Synod bylaws and called upon the regents to repent of their actions.

A number of other actions were taken by the convention. They included:

- Commend use of the new Spanish Language Hymnal \_ Encourage in-person corporate worship
- Affirm in-person Communion and reject virtual Communion
- Ask for study on the uses of online technology
- Reaffirm close(d) Communion
- Reaffirm Biblical positions on marriage and sexuality
- Encourage residential seminary education while continuing the alternate routes to ordination
- Encourage the use of pastoral Winkels for theological study and growth
- Evaluate the current visitation and electoral circuit parameters
- Continue to reject all forms of racism including any claims of the superiority of one race, ancestry, or nationality over another or claims that individuals are racist because of their race, ancestry, or nationality
- Confess that the primary authority over and responsibility in providing for children belongs to the parents and not to the government






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
