### Pastor's Thoughts on the Passing Times

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We often compartmentalize our life. Work life is work life, and Family life is family life; neither the two shall meet. It's a uniquely American skill to compartmentalize our life into neat boxes. Why? Well sometimes it's for reasons such as this part of my life just has no relevance to this other part. But more than likely, the incentive might be to keep the problems or issues that may arise in their own box. Such as not letting work problems influence your family or keeping family issues outside of work. This compartmentalizing extends passed just work and family life. Groups, Social clubs, politics, shared hobbies, other relationships—all these make up a web of boxes we individually interact with and rarely integrate into these other boxes. Sociologists have observed the life of an American is one which is uniquely compartmentalized.

Unfortunately, the uniquely American skill to compartmentalize infiltrates the Christian faith. Church life is church life. The time for practicing faith occurs on Sunday morning. Church clothes and church talk are for Sunday church life. Then it's out of the church box into the work box and family box for the week. Even Christians find little integration of their faith to these other areas of life. It could be for lack of relevance. But more than likely, the incentive might be to keep the problems or issues that may arise away from others. Keeping a private faith private.

Despite what you might think about the millennial generation, Pastors Gene Veith and Trevor Sutton recognize the millennial generation have accurately diagnosed a serious problem in modern society: the lack of work-life integration. Millennials have a nagging sense that modern life is overly compartmentalized and suffers from a lack of overall integration. From this an important question is being raised: How do we bring the disparate pieces of life together into purposeful order?

St. Paul writes, "Christ is the visible image of the invisible God... He existed before all things, and He holds all creation together.... So, He is first in everything... through Him God reconciled all things to himself. He made peace with everything by the blood of the cross," (Col.1:15-20).

One of the great gifts of the Lutheran Reformation is the doctrine of vocation. Vocation is not another word for "occupation." Rather, it was originally about the Christian life fully integrated, meaningful, and teeming with purpose. This doctrine shows Christians how to live out their faith in the world. It is about God's presence in the world and how He works through human beings for His purposes. According to Luther, vocation is a "mask of God." Luther says that God milks the cow through the vocation of the milkmaid. So, looming behind lab coats, overalls, smocks and suits—God is genuinely present and active in what they do for us. Similarly, as we carry out our various vocations, we, too, are masks of God.

Fundamentalists and Evangelicals often talk about what God is doing "in" their lives. Vocation encourages reflection on what God is doing "through" our lives. Luther insisted that the Christian life requires not withdrawal from the world but rather engagement in the world. "God does not need our good works," Luther said, "but our neighbor does." Your relationship with God is based completely on His work for us in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Although we may speak of serving God in our vocations, strictly speaking, we do not serve God. He always serves us.

Vocation discloses the spiritual significance of everyday life. Our spiritual and moral lives are to be found in our relationships and in our tasks in our families, the workplace, the Church, and the Society. Vocation is far more than work-life integration, bridging the chasm between personal and professional; it is the integration of heaven and earth, God's work and our work, family and faith, daily life and divine power, culture and the Christian life. If Christ is the visible image of the invisible God, the church is the visible image of the Savior.

#### Adopt-a-Chaplain: CH (MAJ) Brad Boyer

A while back our St. Timothy family decided to get involved in the Synod's Adopt-a-Chap program to provide support for one of our military chaplains. There is no financial aid involved, but rather we are offering a relationship and prayer support as we learn about his particular ministry in the Army.

We have been paired with Chaplain Brad Boyer who is currently stationed at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma. He has a wife, Chie, and 3 children, Serendipity (16), Sebastien (12), and Isaac (8). He returned to OK about a year ago after being assigned to Korea for a year. His family stayed in the States so his wife could heal from back surgery. He has greatly enjoyed the opportunity to spend time with his family since his return.

In 2020 he established a Lutheran Chapel at Ft. Sill. A couple of LCMS pastors in the area kept it active while he was in Korea. Now it serves about 75 soldiers each week, mostly basic trainees; he says they come as a break from barking drill sergeants and because there are snacks and goodies available that are otherwise forbidden them. Many of them do not have a church background so it is a wonderful opportunity for him to share the love of God as he establishes relationships with them.

He and his family will probably be moving to Ft. Cavazos (formerly Ft. Hood) in TX at the end of the summer but he doesn't actually have those orders yet. He hopes to enroll in the Family Life Chaplain program there in the fall of 2024.

- Thanks that my duties this last year have allowed me lots of family time. Especially welcome after a year away in Korea.
- Thanks for health, good academics, etc. for all.
- Pray that God watch over our (probable) move and all that entails. Pray for patience and wisdom as we transition.
- Please pray for a godly Lutheran chaplain to pick up the Ft Sill Lutheran Chapel when I move. It took a lot of work to get this off the ground, and especially our basic trainee troops need to know that there are godly Lutheran chaplains to serve their specific needs.
- Pray that God prepare the hearts at my new assignment to not be hostile but receptive. I cannot
  underline this more. Spiritual warfare is real and is the toughest challenge. I have seen some
  answers to
  prayers along these lines this last year that are quite revealing, but it would take too long to get
  into that now.
- Pray that God work on our hearts, too, that we have total peace and confidence in our victory through Christ. And that the fruits of the Spirit be evident in everything we do.

Please give thanks to God for Chaplain Boyer and include these petitions in your prayers.






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
